The Parable of Sower – The Fourth Sunday of St. Luke

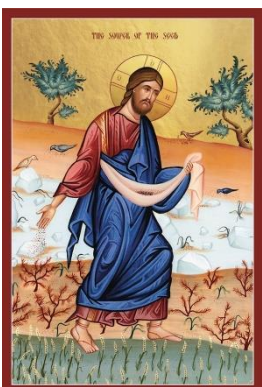
In the Fourth Sunday of Luke which was yesterday, the 16th October, the Evangelist Luke presented the Parable of Sower. Our Lord Jesus Christ used examples from the daily life to express the heavenly and divine truths. He was able in this way to help the man of good will to understand and to accept His divine message. Even today through the Parable of the Sower He takes the example of sowing, an image which is very familiar to the farmers. He compares the seed to the word of God, the earth to men's souls and the various conditions under which one accepts or renounces the word of God in his personal life.

The word of God is always full of life. It is the source of life and strength; it is always holy and powerful. But, to bear fruit it depends on the good will of every man who listens and accepts God's words within his heart. If man, because of his evil intentions does not accept in his heart the word of God, then the Divine Grace does not give its fruits and that soul cannot be vested with the virtues of Christ.

Our Lord Jesus Christ assured us saying, that "not anyone who calls me Lord, Lord, shall enter into the Kingdom of Heaven, but he who does the will of my Father". It is not enough to hear nice and beautiful sermons. It is not enough to study Holy Scriptures. It is not enough to come to church every Sunday and major feast days. All these must be done, but under the basic rule that we practice God's teachings in our daily life.

When the word of God is accepted by a good-willing soul, then it is completely transformed spiritually and bodily. The unbeliever makes him a believer, the man of the flesh makes him spiritual, the greedy makes him a philanthropist, the blasphemer makes him a god-fearing person, the prodigal makes him an honest man.

Thus, we must not only hear or read the word of God, but we should practice it in our daily life.

Dropping off and picking up students – St Andrew the Apostle School

Thank you to all parents for working with us on the new dropping off and pick up arrangements following the closure of the Brunswick Park Road entrance to the North London Business Park. Thank you, also, to those parents who have made the choice to drop off and pick up off site as this reduces traffic and makes the site safer for St Andrew the Apostle students.

Please avoid parking on the double yellow lines or in the disabled parking bays. Drivers who park in these areas or outside these times may receive a parking ticket.

Please refer to the map overleaf. Parents/carers can use the parking bays at the front of the multi-storey car park; if these are full, parents and carers should queue around the multi-storey car park. If you reach the front of the queue and you have not collected your child, you will have to re-join the queue.

Parents are also able to park on the ground floor of the multi-storey car park to wait for their child if they display a valid ticket.

If on site

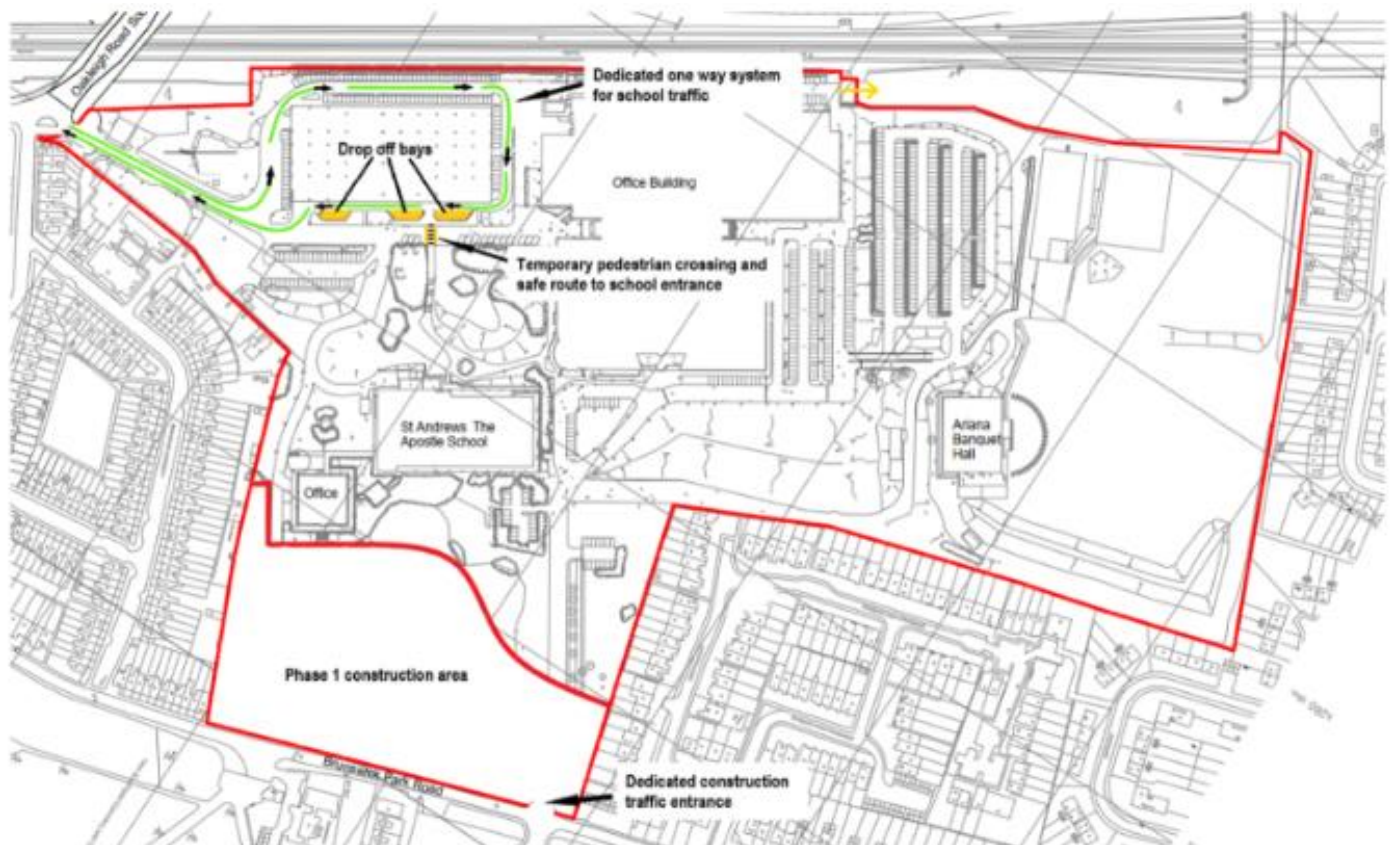
- Please do not park in disabled bays.

Students went to the polls this week to vote for their form's Student Council representative: a formal process that demonstrates to the whole school the values of democracy and having students' voices heard.

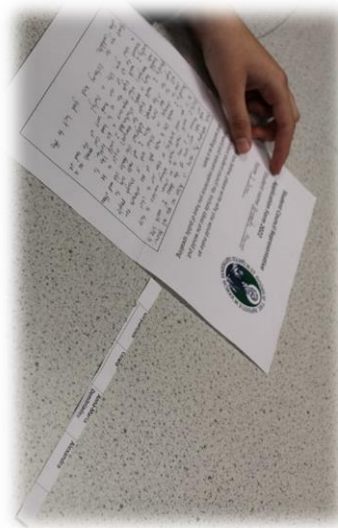


Well done to those students whose applications were strong enough for them to go through to hustings, and

Flu vaccination campaign for years 7, 8 and 9



The NHS has written to schools to update them on changes to the national flu vaccination programme. Please see the contents of their letter below:

We have recently been informed that the flu programme will now include the school years 7, 8 and 9 from September this year.

Early information from the flu season in Australia, shows flu has been circulating earlier than expected and has been affecting younger age groups, therefore DHSC has taken steps to include these age groups in the 2022/23 vaccination campaign. Sessions for flu vaccination have already been planned and confirmed for primary schools so providers will be working with you to arrange additional dates to ensure vaccination can be offered to your students. It is likely that this will be from November onward once additional vaccine supply is available.

We would be very grateful if you could remind parents that their children are entitled to free flu vaccination on the NHS. This vaccine will be provided by a school aged vaccination team that visits the school and is given as a nasal spray. This form of the vaccine is very easy to administer and is especially well suited to preventing onward spread of infection.

The vaccine protects the child against the four main strains of influenza predicted to be in circulation this winter. Young children catch influenza very easily. Children can spread the infection for up to 7 days, which is longer than in adults, therefore vaccinating children reduces the risk of influenza for family members, teaching staff and other children.

In school, children will be mixing with large numbers of other children in a confined environment, which increases the risk of germs (virus and bacteria alike) spreading. Vaccination builds children's immunity to protect against illnesses.

Vaccines stop influenza germs being spread, thus protecting the very vulnerable children and those in the

wider community who may not have, or may not be able to develop, immunity.
